Nurturing the learner: The central role of the tutor in higher education

Friday 9th May 2008

A possible effect of the changing student population in higher education and the increased emphasis on students to develop life-long learning attributes is that university teaching staff may wish to re-evaluate their approach to teaching and question more closely what student learning within higher education means. The annual Professional Development Conference at Staffordshire University is intended to help in that re-evaluation process and provides the opportunity for teaching professionals to talk with, and listen to, leading researchers into student learning. It is hoped that at the end of the conference participants will have a more informed approach to enhancing student learning and a clearer awareness of their own continual professional development needs.

Professor Patricia Broadfoot

Relationships, relationships, relationships: the challenge for a mass higher education system

PATRICIA BROADFOOT has been Vice Chancellor of the University of Gloucestershire since September 2006.

Having joined the University of Bristol in 1981, she was appointed Professor of Education in 1991 becoming subsequently Head of the School of Education, Dean of the Faculty of Social Sciences and Pro Vice Chancellor with responsibility for Education and Widening Participation.

Professor Broadfoot has published extensively in the field of educational assessment. As a sociologist, she has written widely on issues concerning selection and certification as well as on the policy and practice of assessment. Her most recent book, *An Introduction to Assessment* (Continuum, 2007), explores the international impact of educational assessment and some of the exciting new developments linking assessment to learning that are now taking place.

Professor Broadfoot was awarded the CBE in 1996 for services to Social Science.

Professor Stephen Rowland

Integrity and intellectual love in academic enquiry

STEPHEN ROWLAND is Emeritus Professor of Higher Education at University College London and Professor of Higher Education at the Institute of Education.

Having graduated from Cambridge University in engineering and philosophy, Stephen taught and researched into the nature of learning at schools and universities. He has more recently explored how intellectual enquiry can play a more central role in university life, which is the theme of his latest book *The Enquiring University*.

Dr Cecilia Lundholm

Students' conceptual change - emerging issues

CECILIA LUNDHOLM is a researcher in the Department of Education, Stockholm University, where she is a member of the Research on Conceptual Development (RCD) group. Her research focuses on undergraduate students' learning in environmental and economics education from a constructivist perspective. Currently Dr Lundholm is a visiting research fellow on a Leverhulme fellowship at Staffordshire University's Institute for Education Policy Research where she is involved in two research projects which focus on students' learning in economics and investigating the development of systems thinking in economics.
