

Twenty-Four people came to this Staffs CAN with a mix of community members, and representatives from across the community.

This Staffs CAN offered an opportunity for people to reflect on the first 12 months of Staffs CAN and what it has done who it has brought together. This workshop also introduced <u>Staffordshire University's Connected</u> <u>Communities Staff Operations Group (Staffs CCOG)</u>.

People that came to Staffs CAN also took part in a range of activities, starting with a speed networking opportunity to connect with a range of people from across the county. This was followed by a consultation led by the team from <a href="Appetite">Appetite</a>, Conversations about the upcoming Raising Voices: Taking Action Project and a final look at the Connected Communities Evaluation Report.

The session concluded with a look to the future, and what is coming next from Connected Communities at Staffordshire University, including updates from the <u>Public Engagement and Research (PEaR) Team</u>.

### The first 12 months of Staffs CAN











# Public Manifesto for Research- Treasure Map Giant Boardgame



As part of Staffordshire University's commitment to the public's engagement in locally relevant research, throughout 2024 and beyond the Public Engagement and Research (PEaR) Team will be collaborating with communities from across Staffordshire to talk about the kinds of research they would like to see that can make impact for them. Working with a Student Intern, the PEaR Team have developed a giant treasure map to help support communities engage in conversations about research, in a playful and accessible way.

Staffs CAN piloted the game by playing it and answering the questions linked to improving it. The Treasure Map activity is designed so that a range of diverse questions could be used alongside it, meaning that it is flexible in how it incorporates ideas. With this flexible approach it is hoped that the game can enable a range of people to engage in discussion thanks to its accessible nature.

# Appetite Consultation- What art would people like to see locally?



As a consortium partner to Appetite, we were delighted to host their consultation that asked people at Staffs CAN have their say about what artforms they know Appetite have brought to Stoke-on-rent and Newcastle Under Lyme and what people would like to see in the future. Potential options included literature, visual art, digital, festival, and performing arts,

Additionally, the team from appetite ran two other consultations to gather people's thoughts about arts and culture activities and opportunities.

The information from this will be used to help inform what Appetite provide in North Staffordshire moving forward.



### **Raising Voices: Taking Action**



Raising Voices: Taking Action is led by a mixed group of people with lived and learnt experiences of poverty. The group includes <u>All the Small Things</u> <u>CIC</u>, <u>Expert Citizens CIC</u> and Staffordshire University.

The project follows on from previous projects <u>Get Talking Hardship</u> and <u>Raising Voices</u>.

Raising Voices: Taking Action brings people together in Stoke-on-Trent.

- to talk about what causes poverty, and what makes it worse.
- to build our power to take action to tackle poverty.

We hope that through a united effort, people in diverse communities can join forces to deal with the causes of poverty in Stoke-on-Trent.

Raising Voices: Taking Action will also think about the set-up of a Poverty Truth Commission in Stoke-on-Trent.
