

In collaboration with Locate International, we have opened our very own Cold Case Unit to give assistance to police investigators and families of both missing and deceased people, with the aim of solving active cold cases and giving you access to a network of international contacts. Depending on your area of expertise while you're with us, our Cold Case Unit will invite you to investigate a police-allocated cold case with a team of like-minded students and experienced staff.

### KEVIN COLLS







Successful completion of this course provides one of the recognised routes into the police service. However, successful attainment does not in itself provide any guarantee of recruitment as a trainee police constable. Each police force within England and Wales sets out its own recruitment process and selection policy, and entry requirements may vary from force to force. Prospective students are therefore strongly advised to check the specific requirements of their chosen force prior to undertaking study.

It provides an understanding of how to recognise risks in a variety of environments, what methods can be used for threat analysis and mitigation solutions. The BSc pathway is analytical, investigative and operational, while the BA pathway is theoretically and conceptually based.
